

GLOCHESKI SUED FOR \$10,000; IS HELD ON CAPIAS

Assistant Prosecutor Accused
of Refusing to Return Sum
of \$7,000.

JOHN DUPREE OBTAINS WRIT

Defendant Alleged to Have
Promised to Remove Girl
from This Country.

Roman F. Glocheski, assistant prosecuting attorney, was arrested on a writ of capias Wednesday morning following the beginning of a suit for \$10,000 damages brought by John Dupree of this city in Superior court Tuesday. The specific charge is the alleged failure to obtain the return of \$7,000 alleged to have been paid Glocheski to remove Margaret Naujalis, a fourteen-year-old Lithuanian girl, from the country so she could not appear against Dupree who was facing a statutory charge in court.

Dupree in the declaration filed Wednesday alleged that during the pendency of the criminal charge against him he paid Glocheski, then secretary to Mayor George E. Ellis, \$7,000 providing he would remove the Naujalis girl from jurisdiction of the court and send her to Canada or Lithuania. Glocheski accepted the money. Dupree's declaration alleges, but failed to take the girl away and she appeared against him in Superior court.

The case against Dupree first was tried in Superior court and a conviction resulted. It was appealed to the Superior court and a new trial was ordered. The Superior court freed him at the second trial. The Naujalis girl appeared at both trials, although Glocheski was supposed to have removed her before the second trial, the affidavit alleges.

Glocheski Out on Bond.

Glocheski's bond was fixed at \$3,000 by Judge Major L. Dunham in Superior court Tuesday afternoon. Glocheski furnished bond Wednesday afternoon and was released by the sheriff, in whose custody he was.

According to the declaration Dupree was arrested June 26, 1911, on a statutory charge. The Naujalis girl shortly afterward was taken to the Home of the Good Shepherd in this city.

Aug. 19, 1911, it is alleged in the declaration. Glocheski represented to Dupree that the Naujalis girl and her

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parents were Lithuanian Catholic people and that it was the desire of the Naujalis family to return to Lithuania. Glocheski also is alleged to have represented himself to be an officer of the church and to have represented that if \$7,000 was paid him he could arrange it so that the Naujalis girl and her family could be sent to Lithuania. This would prevent her appearing at the trial in Superior court. He also stated, the declaration charges, that the family was anxious to drop the case and that he could arrange everything for Dupree.

Says Money Was Kept.

The declaration charges that the \$7,000 was paid to Glocheski with the understanding that if he did not carry out his part of the bargain it would be returned to Dupree. The money was paid to Glocheski, it is alleged in the declaration, Aug. 26, 1911, in the office of ex-Mayor George E. Ellis.

Dupree's declaration alleges the money never was returned to Dupree, although both the girl and her family appeared against him at the Superior court trial.

Dupree alleges that he has repeatedly asked Glocheski for the money but that the request has not been complied with.
