

# DUPREE-GLOCHESKI SUIT IS DISMISSED

## Action of Aged Man Against Attorney Dropped by Sealed Stipulation.

Nicely sealed in a jacket bound with red tape, fastened by a generous dab of wax of a darker hue the stipulation for dismissal of the suit instituted by John Dupree charging Attorney Roman F. Glocheski with defrauding him of \$7,000 was tucked away in the vault of Superior court Tuesday afternoon.

Dupree a few years ago was charged with taking improper liberties with a little girl. Before the case against him was closed he fled from the city. Because of the man's age the late Judge William J. Stuart promised that in event of Dupree's return he would not insist upon imprisonment and would allow the alternative of a fine. When Dupree returned from Texas after Judge Stuart's death he was sentenced by Judge Willis B. Per-

kins, officiating for Judge Dunham, who was disqualified, to pay a fine of \$1,000.

Some time after Dupree paid his fine he started suit against Glocheski, who then was assistant prosecutor under Edward N. Barnard. Dupree charged that while the case was pending against him Glocheski at the time he was secretary to Mayor George E. Ellis, offered to effect the return of the complaining witness to Europe for the consideration of \$7,000. This amount Dupree charged he gave Glocheski, but that the latter did not do as he had promised. In his suit he asked for \$10,000 damages.

Glocheski denied Tuesday afternoon that he had paid any money in settlement of the case. Attorney L. T. Herman, who represented Dupree, refused to discuss the case. The stipulation provided dismissal of the case without costs to either party.
